New airport COVID-19 testing lets travelers avoid mandatory quarantines

SALT LAKE CITY — The coronavirus outbreak has created an added wrinkle for air travel, with many states and countries requiring quarantine periods or recent negative test results for entry. But a new COVID-19 testing service at Salt Lake City International Airport can ensure travelers don't have to stay in lockdown once they reach their destination.

For Cornell University student Michaela Thomas, who was awaiting a connecting flight on her way for a two-week visit to see her sister in Hawaii, the ability to show proof of a negative COVID-19 test is a great relief that prevents her from having to self-isolate upon arrival in the Aloha State.

"If you don't receive a negative test before you leave, you have to quarantine for 10 days, but if you receive a negative test before departure, you're allowed to bypass the quarantine," she said. "This is a great thing to have, especially if you do get tested at home and you don't get your results in time. You're able to still travel and not be held up in a city."

"It's a huge sense of relief. I thought I was going to have to spend another night in Salt Lake City waiting for my results from back home, so this is awesome."

Health and wellness company XpresSpa Group, in conjunction with airport officials, Wednesday announced the opening of an XpresCheck COVID-19 testing site at the airport. The pop-up facility is housed within the former XpresSpa location in Concourse A. The converted facility is equipped with four testing rooms with an expected ability to provide more than 300 tests per day.

"It was a significant business pivot for us coming out of spa and wellness treatments," explained Scott Milford, the chief operating officer for XpresSpa Group. "We provide two types of testing at the Salt Lake City location — we do polymerase chain reaction test or PCR, that's kind of the gold standard of COVID testing where they do a deep nasopharyngeal."

"Once they're taken, the samples get sent out to a lab for processing and the results are (available) usually within two to four days depending on volume," he said. "We also do a rapid nasal swab test, which is another nasopharyngeal swab. That test is actually put into a machine (on location) where it is molecularly amplified and they can give you a result within about 15 minutes."

The rapid test retails for \$200 and is not covered by health insurance, while the PCR test costs \$75 and is covered by most insurance plans, he said. These services are available to all airline passengers as well as all airport employees, including airline employees, contractors and workers, concessionaires and their employees, TSA officers and U.S. Customs and Border Protection agents, a news release stated.

XpresSpa operates COVID-19 testing sites in seven locations in the U.S.: Denver, Phoenix and Salt Lake City in the West, along with two locations at Boston Logan International Airport as well as Newark and their original testing facility at John F. Kennedy International Airport in New York City.

U.S. Air Force Airman Calie Lewis, who is stationed in Great Britain and also traveling on holiday to Hawaii, said she was pleasantly surprised to come across the testing facility in the airport.

"It was crazy because I just got off my flight to walk to my gate and I was thinking, 'Where am I going to go?' I know I'm going to have to get my test there and have to wait for it," she said. "So literally getting off a flight and seeing this here was awesome. Hawaii is really strict on its COVID testing and who they're allowing (the results) from and this (company) is the last one on the list, so it all worked out."

She said being able to get the rapid test and the results so quickly is a big relief not having to worry about quarantining during her visit.

"Absolutely, because now I can go have fun and be able to walk into the airport and just have my test results readily available rather than just like saying, 'Hey, I'll quarantine for 10 days' and then missing out on an entire vacation."

She mentioned that despite the added expense of the rapid test, having peace of mind during her travels was well worth the cost.

"We live in a new time now, so you have to kind of put that in your budget and know that you're going to have to pay a little extra to go anywhere," Lewis said. "So if I know that I'm going to have to spend the \$200 to get a test, then I know to put that in my budget beforehand so I'm not struggling to get to the vacation. That's what it comes down to."

New business at Salt Lake airport offers rapid COVID-19 tests to travelers

SALT LAKE CITY (KUTV) — Shaping the future of travel, a new business at the Salt Lake International Airport aims to bring safety and peace of mind to travelers.

XpresCheck, formerly XpresSpa, is now offering COVID-19 testing for any ticketed passenger or airport or airline staff.

"Hopefully we can rebuild some of the confidence that was lost because of the virus and get people traveling again," Scott Milford, Chief Operating Officer for XpresSpa Group said.


"When COVID hit, we were deemed a non-essential business and we had to close all of our spas." Milford said

w the idea of airport COVID-19 testing was born. They now have seven locations and wing. Travelers can make an appointment ahead of time or walk in to be tested.

"If they're between flights, running from one terminal to another they can actually come in and get tested and at least get the peace of mind that they're either infected with the virus, hopefully not, or that they have a negative test," Milford said.

They offer two types of tests, PCR and Rapid. The PCR test costs \$75 and is covered by most insurance companies. The rapid test cost travelers \$200 which is a point of care charge.

Kevala Jokiel got a rapid test on Wednesday. He was traveling from Utah back to his home in Honolulu, Hawaii. In order enter Hawaii, he must have proof of a negative test or quarantine for 10 days.

"Within 15 minutes, I'll have the results, I'll be on the plane and I'll be able to go home without quarantining," Jokiel said.

His test camp back negative and was able to board his flight with no issues.

"[lt's] just quick and easy, right at your gate," he said.

XpresCheck is now open in Concourse A.

"When hope to help rebuild confidence in the travel industry," Milford said.

These services can be accessed not only by all airline passengers but also airport employees, including airline employees, concessionaires and their employees, contractors and workers.

The company stated that all insurance plans will be acknowledged outside of the network. It also assured that all information will remain private and comply with HIPAA.

SALT LAKE CITY — The Salt Lake City International Airport opened a new COVID-19 testing site on Wednesday.

A shop near airline gates that used to be a massage and spa place, is now a coronavirus test shop.

XpresSpa turned 7 of their 23 airport shops into XpressCheck for those needing a test for travel.

Scott Milford, the XpresSpa Group Chief Operating Officer, said all of their shops were deemed "non-essential" at the beginning of the pandemic.

"We thought how can we continue to serve the travel industry?" said Milford.

That's when the idea of a COVID-19 testing service shop was put on the table.

Milford said their goal remains the same as before -- providing services and increasing consumer confidence while traveling.

"We're helping folks one way or another and hopefully that keeps people traveling," said Milford.

Kevala Jokiel, was one of the first few tested at the SLC shop.

Jokiel was visiting Utah from Hawaii to experience snowboarding for the first time.

Jokiel did not want to end his trip on a down note or return to Hawaii for a 10-day quarantine.

"I kept myself safe and didn't want to bring COVID-19 back to anyone, so I got tested," said Jokiel.

Fox 13 was asked to not take video of Jokiel receiving his test but watched as he received his results.

"It says it's negative," said Jokiel. "Great, I can go home!

The results took some time to process due to a power outage at the airport, but Milford said customers should receive their rapid test results within 15 minutes.

The plan is to administer more than 300 tests per day.

Customers can receive the PCR testing, which takes a few days to process results, or the nasal rapid test.

The tests are available to both airline employees and passengers.

Depending on one's insurance policy, the tests can cost anywhere from 70 to 200 dollars.





National mask mandate not prompting major changes at airport

SALT LAKE CITY (ABC 4) – The national mask mandate goes into effect at midnight. It was signed by the president last week and requires passengers to wear a mask in airports and on planes, trains, ships, and intercity buses.

The Salt Lake Airport and various airlines have been requiring masks since the start of the pandemic but now passengers who fail to comply- could be faced with repercussions from the federal government.

"It's no problem off my back, putting a mask on," passenger Hank Olson said.

Since the start of the pandemic, airport officials say masks have been required in the airport and by most airlines. This mandate gives federal agencies like TSA the ability to enforce the mandate.

"I think having this federal guideline just helps reinforce the importance of wearing a mask and gives us the ability to enforce it," Nancy Volmer with the Salt Lake Airport said.

Just last week, a group of passengers departing from Salt Lake en route to Dallas were kicked off an American Airlines flight due to not improperly wearing a mask.

The Association of Flight Attendants released a statement reading in part: "Executive action on a mask mandate for interstate travel, including airports and planes, will provide much needed back up for Flight Attendants and aviation workers on the frontlines."

The Utah Transit Authority says masks have been well received by passengers.

"In many cases, we are asking people to board a bus through the rear door instead of the front door and we have been doing a lot of enhanced cleaning," Carl Arky says.

Masks will also be required in all taxis and ride sharing vehicles.

Failure to comply could be a federal crime but the CDC says a civil penalty is more likely.

SALT LAKE CITY — The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has issued an order requiring the wearing of masks by travelers to prevent the spread of the virus which causes COVID-19.

The order requires passengers on all public conveyances (airplanes, ships, ferries, trains, buses, subways, taxis, ride-shares) traveling *into*, *within*, *or out of* the United States, to wear a mask over both the nose and mouth.

READ: TSA to begin enforcing face covering requirement at airports, transportation hubs starting Tuesday

While the Salt Lake City International Airport already has a mask requirement in place, the Transportation Safety Administration has implemented provisions from President Joe Biden's executive order.

"For TSA's purposes that means if you come to the airport and there is a face mask requirement at SLC but you come to the security checkpoint and you don't have your mask on, TSA will deny you entry into the screening checkpoint," said Lorie Dankers, a TSA spokesperson. "They (travelers) must wear a face mask that fits snuggly across their nose and their mouth, they need to make sure it's not a gaiter or a bandana that in fact it can even be homemade or surgical cloth mask all of those work."

Per the order, face shields and goggles can be worn as a preventative safety measure, but they must be accompanied by a mask.

"We're finding the vast majority of travelers are wearing their masks to the security checkpoint," Dankers said. "If for a chance somebody had not been wearing a mask or additional screening of some sort, our officers would actually offer that traveler a mask for the very purpose of protecting our employee."

Here's a link to a document with all of the details on the new Executive Order.

The order went into effect February 1, 2021 at 11:59 EST and is expected to last until May 11, 2021.

Thw CDC put out a list of requirements and exceptions outlined by the CDC:

People are not required to wear a mask under the following circumstances:

- · While eating, drinking, or taking medication for brief periods of time
- While communicating, for brief periods of time, with a person who is hearing impaired when the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication
- If, on an aircraft, wearing of oxygen masks is needed because of loss of cabin pressure or other event affecting aircraft ventilation
- If unconscious (for reasons other than sleeping), incapacitated, unable to be awakened, or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance
- When necessary to temporarily remove the mask to verify one's identity such as during Transportation Security Administration (TSA) screening or when asked to do so by the ticket or gate agent or any law enforcement official

The following categories of people are exempt from the requirement to wear a mask:

- · A child under the age of 2 years
- A person with a disability who cannot wear a mask, or cannot safely wear a mask, for reasons related to the disability
- A person for whom wearing a mask would create a risk to workplace health, safety, or job duty as determined by the relevant workplace safety guidelines or federal regulations

71 firearms found in carry-on luggage at SLC airport last year

SALT LAKE CITY — The Transportation Security Administration announced Tuesday that 71 firearms were found in carry-on luggage at the Salt Lake City International Airport in 2020, and that firearms were found at twice the rate as in 2019.

That matches a trend seen throughout the country, the TSA said in <u>a news release</u>, where screening officers found firearms in 2020 at "the highest rate since the agency's inception."

In 2020, the TSA found 71 guns at SLC and 3,257 in carry-on bags nationwide. In raw numbers, that's down from 85 guns at SLC and 4,432 nationally in 2019; and 73 locally and 4,239 nationally in 2018.

However, air traffic at SLC in 2020 was only about 48% of its total the year before. Travelers flying out of Salt Lake City brought firearms in carry-on luggage at a rate of 16.8 guns per million travelers screened; the year before, it was only eight firearms per million screened.

Nationally, those rates were about 10 guns per million passengers in 2020 and five guns per million in 2019. Air traffic fell by 500 million passengers nationwide in 2020 because of the coronavirus pandemic.

The Salt Lake City International Airport ranked 10th nationally for the number of firearms found in carry-ons in 2020. The Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport topped the list with 220 guns discovered, followed

by Dallas/Fort Worth at 176 and George Bush Intercontinental Airport, in Houston, with 126.

Rounding out the top 10 were Phoenix Sky Harbor (124), Denver (104), Nashville (94), Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood (87), Orlando (79), and Las Vegas McCarran (72).

Grant Goodlett, the TSA's acting federal security director for Utah, said the agency "continues to ask travelers to carefully pack their carry-on bags to ensure that firearms are not brought to the security checkpoint."

"TSA officers continue to be focused during their screening duties to ensure that firearms — and other security threats — do not make it into the cabin of an aircraft," he said in the release.

Travelers found with guns in their carry-on luggage face "potential criminal citations" as well as "civil penalties." "TSA evaluates each firearm incident on a case-by-case basis," the release says, including whether the weapon was loaded and whether there was accessible ammunition.

In 2020, 83% of firearms found were loaded according to a TSA infographic.

Firearms can be transported on commercial flights, but only in checked luggage after being properly declared at the ticket counter during check-in. They must be unloaded and stored in a "locked, hard-sided case."

SALT LAKE CITY — Despite the decrease in air travel due to the coronavirus pandemic, Transportation Security Administration officers at the Salt Lake City International Airport confiscated nearly the same amount of guns from passengers in 2020 as in 2019.

According to a **press release**, TSA confiscated 71 guns at the airport, a decrease in 14 firearms from the year before when travel was nearly double without the pandemic.

The **Salt Lake Tribune** reports passengers flying out of Salt Lake City "brought firearms in their carry-on luggage at a rate of 16.8 guns per million travelers screened in 2020, compared to 8 per million in 2019."

That rate is 68% higher than the national rate.

Salt Lake City International Airport recorded the tenth-most amount of guns seized among U.S. airports.

About five guns per million passengers were found across the country in 2019, TSA said.

WATCH: Concealed carry weapon permit classes on the rise in Utah

In 2019, TSA agents found 4,432 firearms at all U.S. airport checkpoints, of which 87% were loaded.

"I commend our officers for their commitment to TSA's security mission by identifying and stopping these weapons at the TSA checkpoints. Firearms are strictly prohibited on board planes in the passenger cabin," said Senior Official Performing the Duties of TSA Administrator Darby LaJoye in the news release. "Bringing a firearm to a TSA security checkpoint poses a serious risk to TSA officer and passenger safety, and doing so may result in significant fines or arrest."

Most guns were discovered at Atlanta's Hartsfield-Jackson International Airport with 220. Dallas/Ft. Worth International came in second with 176 guns confiscated.

In 2020, the TSA says they found a total of 71 firearms in carry-on luggage at Salt Lake City International Airport while conducting routine security checks.

Locally, the TSA screened approximately 4.2 million departing travelers at the SLC airport in 2020. Of those screenings, statistics show people traveling out of SLC brought firearms in carry-on luggage at a rate of 16.8 firearms per million travelers screened, which is above the 2020 national average. The national average is about 10 firearms per million passengers screened, according to the TSA.

Compared to previous years, the total number of firearms found at security checkpoints didn't vary much. In fact, in the year 2020 the TSA reported the least amount of firearms spotted in carry-on luggage. In 2018, the TSA reported 73 firearms at security checkpoints, and 81 firearms in 2019.

National firearm statistics from TSA

It was a record-breaking year for TSA agents. Nationally, the discovery rate of firearms in carry-on luggage doubled in 2020. That year was the highest in the agency's history. In total, the TSA found 3,257 firearms in carry-on luggage in 2020.

In 2020, TSA screened approximately 324 million travelers at airports nationwide — only 39% of approximately 824 million screened in 2019. Despite a significant drop in screenings because of the pandemic, the TSA said it detected roughly 10 firearms per million passengers screened as compared to 5 firearms per million passengers screened in 2019.

TSA protocol for traveling with firearms

People are allowed to travel with firearms, but there's a handful of rules that must be followed in order to do so. Even if someone has a concealed carry permit, they are prohibited from bringing a firearm onto a plane.

"Firearms can be transported on a commercial aircraft only if they are unloaded, packed in a locked, hard-sided case, and placed in checked baggage," said the TSA. "Any type of replica firearm is prohibited in carry-on baggage and must be transported in checked luggage."



TSA firearm statistics (TSA)

The TSA advises everyone traveling with a firearm to check with the airline they're flying with for specific instructions.

If a traveler disobeys these regulations, they could be subjected to civil or criminal penalties. The TSA said they evaluate each firearm situation differently. For example, when determining a civil penalty, the agency considers "whether the firearm was loaded and whether there was accessible ammunition."

The best piece of advice from the TSA: don't bring your gun through security.

Holiday crowding revealed problems at new Salt Lake City **International Airport**

Tweaks are being considered to help with the longer walk as well as wheelchair service and baggage systems.

The Christmas and New Year holidays were the first real test of how the first phase of the sparkling new \$4.1 billion Salt Lake City International Airport could handle bigger crowds — because the pandemic had kept them small.

It didn't do well, officials now concede. But they say they are working on fixes.

"There were some kinks, I'll be the first to say," Bill Wyatt, airport executive director, told the city Airport Advisory Board on Wednesday.

Disabled people had trouble getting wheelchair assistance. The baggage system sometimes didn't work. Airport roads were congested with confused drivers. And more than anything, people complained about how much longer the walk is to the gates.

The walks indeed are longer. Wyatt explained why and discussed some tweaking the airport is considering to help.

"The reality is it's a big, beautiful airport — emphasis on big and beautiful — and people are going to take some time getting used to this because it's very different," he said.

Wyatt noted that the old airport was built generally for smaller aircraft, so gates were spaced more closely, and the airport was compact and small. Now aircraft are bigger and require more room between gates in two concourses that are separated by a 990-foot tunnel (longer than three football fields).

In the old airport, Wyatt said he often could go from the parking lot to a gate in 8 minutes. "That just isn't the case at a big-boy, world class airport like we have now," he said. "It functions differently than the old airport in many, many ways."

So the airport has been suggesting that people arrive two hours before flights to ensure they can make the longer trips to gates plus parking, ticketing and security.

Wyatt noted that with the longest possible trip, people must get from parking to the terminal, maybe to ticket agents, through security, down the terminal hall, turn into Concourse A, find a tunnel halfway down it, travel through the long tunnel to Concourse B, come out and walk maybe to a distant gate. Some flights temporarily are also using a hard-stand operation, where passengers are taken by shuttle to the tarmac where they walk up steps.

He said moving walkways cover about 70% of that distance, but it still takes time.

Wyatt said the airport is considering offering golf-cart-like shuttles in the current tunnel to help some people, because it figures it has space there that allows it.

An under-construction central tunnel is being built large enough to someday allow a planned train there when a third concourse is built 15-20 years from now — so it may also allow carts until then.

Wyat said not enough room exists in gate concourses for such shuttles. He added that the airport once offered carts years ago but stopped them because of a high number of lawsuits from people who were hit in crowded halls. Also, he said airlines did not want them in the new airport and did not want to help fund wider concourses needed to allow them.

He said the best option for people unable physically to handle longer walks is a wheelchair. But he said many disabled people had trouble getting a wheelchair during the holidays.

Wyatt said a contractor that offers wheelchair service failed to hire enough people to handle unexpectedly large crowds, when about 22,000 local passengers showed up at the airport on the Sunday after Christmas instead of the 7,000 or 8,000 people who had been arriving during the pandemic.

"The spike in passenger volume was so sharp and so sudden that the company that provides that service for the airlines simply wasn't staffed up to handle that," Wyatt said. "That's a problem that time is going to resolve, because from this point forward, the increase in passenger volume is going to be sufficiently gradual so that they'll be able to staff accordingly."

The airport is also looking at changing how passengers request a wheelchair.

Now they must go to a ticket agent who calls for a wheelchair by radio. Wyatt said the airport is looking at creating some podiums in the terminal lobby where people may receive a wheelchair, and then be taken to ticketing and other locations. He says it should be more efficient.

Wyatt said the airport also had some failures with baggage handling with the bigger crowds, but blames that more on people not used to higher volume than on the new machinery itself.

"The machinery has performed very effectively. It's still many of the service providers, ticket agents and others getting used to how this works," he said.

Wyatt said the airport is working to resolve problems it finds and is preparing for expected bigger crowds. He said Delta Air Lines — which operates about 70% of the airport's flights through its hub operation — expects to return to 85% of normal in spring or summer as more people are able to obtain vaccines.

"That's just going to trigger a lot of leisure travel," he said.

He expects business travel to remain slow as many businesses have become accustomed to holding online meetings. Also, he expects international travel to be slow to return.



ground loading during busy times and for overnight aircraft parking. After the upgrades, all three pads can accommodate aircraft with higher pavement classification number (PCN) ratings.

"Because of COVID and the drastic drop of air traffic, we felt there was an opportunity to get it all done at once without disrupting passengers or airlines," said Brett Smith, CEO of Propeller Airports. "Completing the project without any traffic on the tarmac helped the reconstruction process run smoothly. Moreover, the new concrete is considered to be a 30-year fix."

Before the pandemic, about 3,000 passengers used the terminal each day,

with United Airlines and Alaska Airlines serving a total of 12 cities. More than a million passengers visited the airport in its first year of commercial service.

Salt Lake City International


The pandemic wasn't enough to dampen the excitement at Salt Lake City International this fall, as the airport opened its brand-new Concourse A-West in September and Concourse B in October. The concourses are part of a total airport rebuild and expansion that includes a new terminal, parking garage and other facilities.

For the old terminals and concourses, the initial plan was to demolish them in

stages and rebuild right on top of them, essentially removing one gate at a time and then replacing it with a new one. The airlines would have all the space they needed during construction of the last two concourses, but the construction process would be complex, costly and lengthy.

With traffic down sharply, Salt Lake City International met with its airlines and determined that they didn't really need to use the old concourses. So, the airport adapted to new realities and demolished the old concourses all at once. Accelerating the project shaved two years off the timeline, and the new concourses are scheduled to open in December 2024.

"It's just a much simpler, cleaner construction process now," said Bill Wyatt, Executive Director of the Salt Lake Department of Airports. "We will have saved as much as \$300 million in the process, so I guess you could characterize that as a silver lining in some respects. It's a pretty dark cloud that doesn't have a silver lining in it somewhere, so you just always have to be looking for that." <



Exclusive: Utah family kicked off plane over masks

According to the airline, the family was noncompliant with their face covering policy.

The Wilson family said that was not the case, and there was only one incident while boarding where a mask accidentally fell below a member's nose but was quickly corrected.

"I didn't really see who it was but somebody said, 'Hey, you know, keep your mask up," Scott Wilson said. "I dropped everything and moved it up, picked up my stuff and made our way to the back of the plane."

Wilson said when the family finally got to their seats, a gate agent approached them with some bad news from the crew.

"He said, 'Well, they want you to leave the plane," Wilson said. "I said, 'What, they want us to get off the plane? Can we talk, can we have a conversation?' Nobody has even really talk to us."

The family said the gate agent left and came back again insisting the captain of the flight crew needed them off.

"He says, 'I'm sorry, it has to be the whole family," Wilson said.

All 10 adults and 10 children, ranging in ages from 3-13, left as other passengers on the plane chimed in.



already mad at these guys. They didn't do anything," Wilson said.

KSL spoke to a witness who said he saw the family wearing masks at all times and feels they were unfairly removed. He also shared that with the airline, which interviewed him after the flight.

The family was split up and eventually rebooked on American, United and Delta flights to make it to Hawaii the same day. The family said it was all thanks to the Salt Lake gate agents who were on their side.

"They were livid," Wilson said. "They were mad at this guy and said, 'He is the one with the problem, you guys did nothing wrong. We've never seen anything like this. We've never had a situation like this, and he was totally in the wrong by doing what he did."

Here is the airline's full statement to KSL:

"On Sunday, Jan. 24, passengers traveling on American Airlines flight 1214 from Salt Lake City International Airport (SLC) to Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport (DFW) were reported to be noncompliant with our mandatory face covering policy, which requires face coverings be worn properly over the nose and mouth. We have since strengthened our policy to require face coverings be worn at airports and on board, and announced in June that we may deny future travel for customers who refuse to wear a face covering for the duration of this requirement." the spokesperson told FOX 13.

Utah (ABC4) — A group traveling from Salt Lake City to Dallas were kicked off their flight for not properly wearing their face masks.

According to a spokesperson with American Airlines, on Sunday, January 24, passengers traveling on American Airlines flight 1214 from Salt Lake City International Airport (SLC) to Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport (DFW) were reported to be non-compliant with the airline's mandatory face-covering policy.

The policy requires face coverings to be worn properly over the nose and mouth at all times, the spokesperson shares with ABC4.

"Per procedure, the customers involved were asked to exit the aircraft before departure and the flight departed for DFW shortly after," the spokesperson adds.

The airline says according to internal reports, the passengers were reminded to wear their face covering properly.

"After having a conversation with the group, our team at SLC confirmed with the customers that they agree to comply with the face-covering policy if they were rebooked on flights to their destination. They ultimately agreed and were rebooked to complete their travel," the spokesperson shares.

Empty seat suggestion leads to man being removed from flight in Salt Lake



SALT LAKE CITY (KUTV) — With empty seats on a flight leaving the Salt Lake International Airport, a man says his suggestion to spread passengers out led to him being removed from the plane.

The incident happened on a Delta flight from Salt Lake City to St. Louis on Tuesday.

The passenger who recorded the incident, who asked to only be identified by his first name, Garth, says while the plane was still at the gate, he noticed most of the passengers were seated in the last several rows of the airplane while there were rows of empty seats toward the middle and front.


"There was no reason not to [move the passengers up]; they didn't mention anything about the plane balance or anything, and with a few people moving a few feet that should have been pretty easy for them to handle," Garth told 2News.



But when he was told it wasn't an option to move passengers forward, the situation between Garth and the flight crew escalated.

"They're going to punish us all by not having people sit in those seats ... You're not going to get the it," Garth can be heard saying in the video.

"Customers purchasing seats in one class are not randomly permitted free upgrades into another class, even when seats are available," a Delta Airlines spokesperson wrote in a statement to 2News.

Garth says the Delta crew had offered passengers the opportunity to pay to upgrade classes before boarding.

6 I'm fine with all the COVID regulations and the guidelines, and I've always been patient, but upselling safety, that's where I draw the line. I said 'you know this isn't right, and you know I'm going to complain," Garth said.

In Garth's video, he tells a flight crew member that he refuses to get off the plane and would only leave if police told him to. He claims he was removed from the plane after saying he was gc^{-1} to post his complaints on social media.



"There was no reason not to [move the passengers up]; they didn't mention anything about the plane balance or anything, and with a few people moving a few feet that should have been pretty easy for them to handle," Garth told 2News. (KUTV)

"As passenger safety and security is our top priority, failure to follow crew instructions can result in removal from the aircraft," the statement from Delta says.

The video shows the other passengers urge Garth to leave the plane, which he does.

"At that point I decided it was best to leave the plane," he said.

Delta Airlines has implemented COVID-19 protections on flights, including a mask requirement, filtered air, and empty middle seats between passengers.
