

Chair Igor Best-Devereux called the meeting to order at 8:00 a.m.

AGENDA

A. Minutes

The motion was made by Robert Bergman and seconded by Larry Pinnock to approve the minutes of May 25, 2016 as presented. All votes were affirmative; motion passed.

B. Director's Report

Maureen Riley, Executive Director, updated the Airport Advisory Board regarding current events.

 Riley gave an update on the status of the fixed based operator (FBO) at South Valley Regional Airport (SVR) and the Request for Proposals (RFP) that will be issued for FBO services at SVR. We are currently working with the Mayor's office on terms for hangar rents and terms surrounding the amount of investment. The Operations Division has been performing the FBO services in the interim until a new RFP and successful candidate could be selected.

- Riley updated the Board on the checkpoint queues. The Airport Operations staff and airline partners have committed some of their employees to assist the TSA during peak periods to help alleviate meltdowns in the checkpoint queues.
- Riley informed the Board that the City Council approved the FY2017 Budget last night.
- Riley reminded the Board that the August meeting would consist of a tour of the TRP construction site on August 3.

Larry Pinnock complimented the Airport on the press reports that Salt Lake City is one of the easiest airports to get through screening. Riley responded that the TSA has been working collaboratively with the Department of Airports to find solutions to problems. Ron Malin, Federal Security Director, started out as an Operations employee at this airport. He knows the airport, operations and the people. The relationships go a long way to finding solutions to problems.

- J.T. Martin wondered what type of help the airport employees give to the TSA at the checkpoints. Riley answered that they answer questions, help with way finding and information, prepare people to go through the checkpoint, intervene with lost and founds items and help people who have missed their flights.
- J.T. Martin inquired as to what was the main reason that has created the congestion for the TSA at checkpoints. Riley responded that one cause was the lower price of fuel resulted in airlines adding more flights; more people were flying resulting in an increase in passenger activity. The number of TSA officials and agents stayed the same. Congress recently responded and funded more overtime.
- J.T. Martin inquired if TSA agents were treated disrespectfully and if there was anything the Board members could do to help alleviate this type of behavior. Riley answered that reaching out to the community to let them know that the TSA will be enforcing the restrictions on the number of carryons per person allowed. Best-Devereux inquired if additional signage could be placed near the entrance to notify passengers. Riley responded that the Airport would look at additional signage and the option of incorporating messages into the overhead videos.

C. Terminal Redevelopment Program Update

Mike Williams, Terminal Redevelopment Program (TRP) Director, presented an update on the TRP (presentation on file). Main points included were:

- Excavation of the underground fuel tanks is complete.
- Clean-up of contaminated soil is underway at several of the existing rental car sites.
- The partial demolition of Concourse E holdroom area is completed and construction is underway on the new exterior wall.
- Central utility plant site is under construction.
- Stone columns and utility work for the South Concourse West are underway.

- The Design Package 4 & 8 Terminal/Gateway/South Concourse West bids received and analysis is underway.
- Package 6 Baggage Handling System bids have been received and analysis is underway.

D. Terminal Redevelopment Program Design Overview

Mike Williams, TRP Director, and Tad Kaczor, TRP Deputy Program Director, presented an update on the terminal design for the TRP (presentation on file). Main points included were:

- Goals and expectations of the TRP.
- Gateway Check-in area.
- Terminal Level 2 consisting of the plaza, concessions, TSA screening, TSA offices, bag claim and meeter-greeter area.
- Terminal Level 3 consisting of SLCDA offices, ticketing, conference center, airline club and airline offices.
- Terminal Level 1 consisting of international meter/greeter, ground transportation, employee screening and Customs and Border Protection area.
- Master Plan full buildout.
- Overall terminal, concourse and gateway plan.

Discussion ensued regarding the current location of the UTA platform, the future location in the TRP, project funding and the strategy moving forward. Riley reminded the Board that there is a State law that prohibits using Airport revenue for rail projects. Best-Devereux stated that there is \$2 billion project critical to the overall economic development of the State of Utah and this is one dysfunctional part that needs to be addressed quickly.

Martin wondered if in the TRP plans there was access to a secure outdoor deck for public use. Riley stated that in the current plans it had not been contemplated but there might be an opportunity for a common club area in the North Concourse.

Cynthia Miller questioned how the Airport was going to preserve and relocate the current art into the new terminal. Riley answered currently we are going through a lengthy process and have engaged an art consultant to evaluate the art collection. We will preserve and relocate the pieces we can. An example is the large stained glass piece, currently located in the International Terminal, that will be relocated to the new Gateway building. There will be a museum gallery with space for rotating art displays located in the new meter/greeter area.

Martin inquired if there would be future public art commissions. Riley stated she would be meeting with Karen Krieger, Executive Director of the Salt Lake City Art Council, to discuss future public art competitions.

The next Board meeting will be held the 3 August 2016.



Current Activities and Progress

Rental Car Facilities – QTA and RSS

- Operation continues to run fairly smooth. The team is addressing a few warranty items.
- Opening of the separate Jockey Road between the existing Parking Garage and the new QTA/RSS Facilities improved the operation.

CGMP# 4 – Landside and Airside Enabling

- Completed the clean-up of contaminated soil at the Existing Rental car Sites.
- Completed Major utility installation in Existing Rental Car Sites.
- Completed demolition of the South Wing of Concourse 'E'.
- Completed and opened the relocated Parking Garage Pay Lane Exit Road and Terminal Exit Road
- Completed approximately 60% of the 7,000 +/- Stone Columns required for this phase.
- Initiated excavation for the Terminal Tunnel
- Preparing to install surcharge in the South Concourse West site.

Current Activities and Progress

Procurement

- Design Package 4/8 Terminal/Gateway/South Concourse West bids received, analysis completed and recommendations made to award 20 of 24 trades – balance this week.
- Design Package 6 Baggage Handling System recommendation to award completed.
- Design Package 5 Roads, Parking Garage and Central Utility Plant bids received.
- Reported in June that there was good bidder participation in the various scopes of work, but budget pressure experienced due to market response. Trade bids received in July and August were the most challenging.
- Approximately \$1 billion in trade contracts to be issued by the end of 2016.




Overall TRP Site






Stone Columns Underway






Current Site Phasing/Construction








Current Program Final Phase Completed




Terminal/Gateway/South Concourse West Trade Bidders






Roads/Parking Garage/Central utility Plant Bidders






Terminal/Gateway/South Concourse West Variances

Utah Construction Activity and Growth

Utah-based general contractors are not likely to admit anytime soon that current economic and building conditions are truly 'back' to the record-setting pre-recession levels in 2006-07, but it's safe to assume that few (if any) are complaining about the robust amount of construction activity happening right now within the borders of the Beehive State.

Even a casual observer - loe O. Public - can drive pretty much in any city within the bustling Wasatch Front corridor (not to mention Park City, Logan and St. George) and take note of a wide array of intriguing construction projects that are underway. A look at the numbers from UC&D's 2016 Top General Contractor Rankings reveals a staggering figure - over 54 billion (\$4,160,000,000) worth of revenues generated from participating firms in 2015, a jump of more than 15% collectively from reported 2014 numbers of \$3,545,187,000.



"Utah's economy has certainly rebounded the past couple of years and many within our industry (general contractors, specialty contractors and suppliers) are as busy as they have been in years", said Rich Thorn, President/CEO of the Associated General Contractors of Utah. "We're enjoying levels of construction activity that we haven't seen since the 2005-2007 era. The robust construction economy has helped our state maintain a leadership position in employment and economic development across not just the west, but the entire nation. Will it continue? We anticipate so. and are optimistic about our foreseeable future."

Construction spending may reach historic growth in 2016. We are currently near the most active 3 year period of growth in construction in more than 20 years, and it's already been ongoing since 2013-2014.

Construction spending is forecast to increase 9.7% in 2016. Spending could reach a total 30% growth for the three years 2014-15-16. The only comparable periods in the last 20 years are 29% in 2003-04-05 and 27% in 2013-14-15.

Uneven growth rates ranging from rapidly increasing spending to slight dips is more an indication of the effects of uneven new starts patterns than a loss of growth momentum.



SPENDING

Nonresidential buildings spending is forecast to grow 13.7% in 2016 and the three-year total growth could reach 40% for 2014-15-16. The only comparable growth periods in the last 20 years are 40% in 2006-07-08 and 32% in 1995-96-97. Major contributions are increasing from institutional work in educational and healthcare markets. Office, commercial retail, lodging and manufacturing will decline considerably from from the levels in 2015 but still provide support to 2016 growth.



U.S. Construction Activity and Growth

ABC reports construction jobs increase

The Associated Builders and Contractors (ABC) reported the U.S. construction industry added 19,000 net new jobs in February according to its analysis of the March 4 U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics employment release. Year-over-year, the industry added 253,000 net new jobs, an increase of 4 percent.

Construction employment surges at year's end

The U.S. construction industry added 45,000 net new jobs in December and 128,000 during the fourth quarter, according to analysis of the January 8, 2016 employment release from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics by Associated Builders and Contractors (ABC). The

ABC reports construction jobs, input materials costs increase

The U.S. construction industry added 37,000 net new jobs in March according to Associated Builders and Contractors Inc.'s (ABC) analysis of a U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics release. On a year-over-year basis, construction employment expanded by 301,000 net new jobs, the industry's largest annual increase since May 2015, according to ABC. The industry added 20,000 net new jobs in February (revised upward from 19,000) and 18,000 net new jobs in January.







- (7) Car Wash Rebuild The apparent low bidder for this project is Paulsen Construction Company. Contract documents are currently being executed.
- (10) SVRA R/W 16-34 & T/W A Pavement Rehabilitation The apparent low bidder for this project is Geneva Rock Products. Contract documents are currently being executed. Construction for this project will begin in the Spring of 2017.

CONSTRUCTION

- (1) **Deicing Pad 34R** The Contractor is currently working on punch list items and warranty work.
- Deicing Pad R/W 16L Taxiway H12 is now closed to allow the Contractor to continue with Phase 3 construction of the deicing pad. The Contractor has completed placing granular fill and lean mix concrete for this phase and is now placing the PCC pavement. The electrical subcontractor is on-site installing in-pavement light bases.
- (3) Taxiway S Pavement Rehabilitation The Contractor was issued substantial completion for this project on August 24, 2016. All punch list items are complete.
- (4) Runway 17-35 and Taxiways P & R Pavement Rehabilitation The Contractor, Staker Parsons Company was issued a notice to proceed on August 1, 2016. Asphalt milling and electrical demolition is currently taking place. Paving of R/W 17-35 continues.

- (6) Concourse B PCC Joint Seal and Repair Phase 2 The Contractor, Granite Construction Company was issued a notice to proceed on August 29, 2016. Work has started and is on schedule.
- (8) Roof Replacements (Terminal Area) Construction for this project has started and is approximately 35% complete.
- (9) **Airport Operations Center -** The Contractor has completed the demolition for the project. Placement of footings, foundations and the concrete slab work is on-going. Overhead fire sprinklers and mechanical ductwork is being installed.
