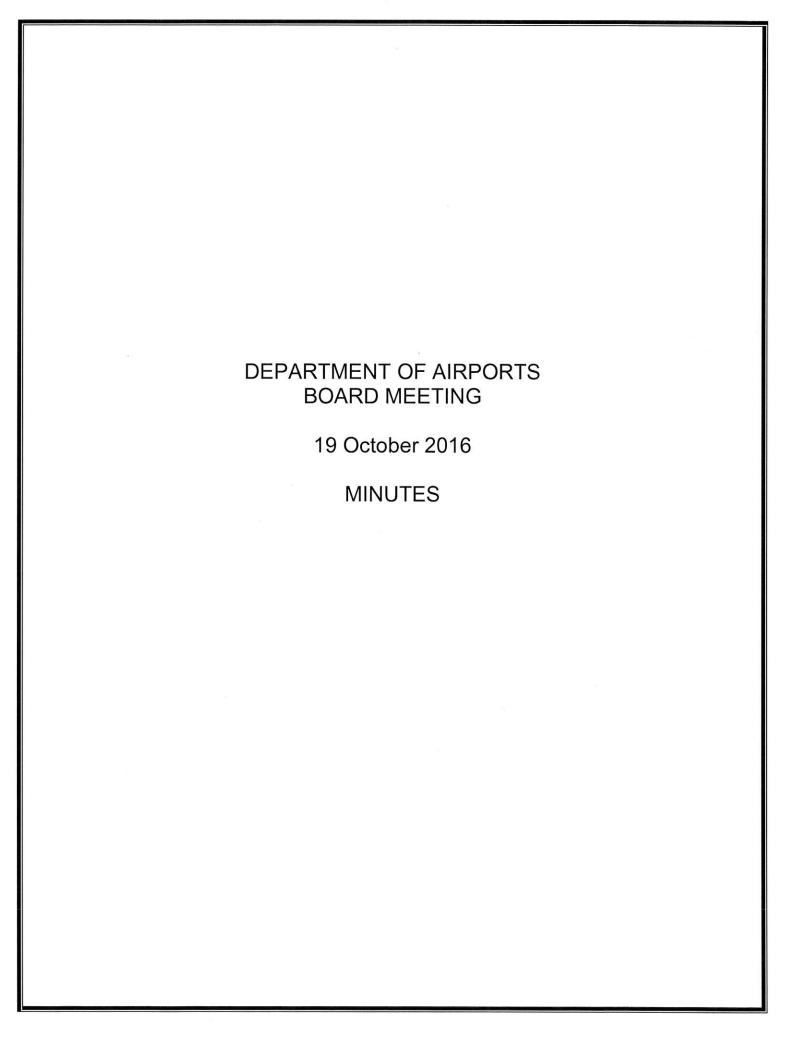

Chair Igor Best-Devereux called the meeting to order at 8:03 a.m.

AGENDA

A. Minutes

The motion was made by Cynthia Miller and seconded by Robert Bergman to approve the minutes of June 15, 2016 and August 3, 2016 as presented. All votes were affirmative; motion passed.

B. Director's Report

Maureen Riley, Executive Director, updated the Airport Advisory Board regarding current events.

- Riley gave an update on the status of the fixed based operator (FBO) at South Valley Regional Airport (SVR). The second Request for Proposals (RFP) received one proposal that was deemed nonresponsive under City procurement rules. Airport staff is currently working with the Mayor's office on terms for hangar rents and terms surrounding the amount of investment. The Operations Division will continue to perform the FBO services for the next year. A comprehensive budget amendment will be presented to the City Council to cover the cost associated with performing the FBO services, for its consideration and approval.
- Riley informed the Board that the TRAX station design contract between HOK and Utah Transit Authority (UTA) has been executed. The value of the contract will be approximately \$5.3 million and will take twelve months to complete. The construction funding is still unresolved at this time.

J.T. Martin asked what size aircraft could operate out of SVR, could SLCDA operate FBO services and what type of neighbor complaints are received. Riley answered that after investigating noise complaints, the complaints usually focus on Air National Guard helicopter operations. The aircraft size is limited to 12,500 pounds and under. The industry practice around the country is to have an FBO operate services at reliever airports.

Best-Devereux inquired if separating out the financing of new hangars in the RFP for SVR make it easier for a new FBO to be responsive. Riley answered that option could be considered but FBO's at reliever airports are a marginal business. FBO operators are usually encouraged to produce additional streams of revenue to insure a positive cash flow. Typically, that includes FBO's collecting the rents from hangars. Bergman asked if a topic of discussion should be readopting an investment lease schedule.

Best-Devereux asked about the impact of a delay in construction funding on the TRAX station on the Airport project. Riley replied that there were some options being discussed. The existing TRAX platform is in the construction path and will need to be moved farther south or the preferred option, an elevated TRAX line, must be implemented.

C. Delta Air Lines Update

Reed Forrester, District Sales Manager, Delta Air Lines, presented an update (presentation on file). Main points included were:

- Delta produced nearly \$1.7 billion of pre-tax income, while operating margins grew to 17.4% in second quarter 2016.
- Generated \$1.6 billion of free cash flow, returned \$1.1 billion to shareholders and ended the quarter with \$6.8 billion of adjusted net debt.
- Record results included \$324 million in profit sharing for Delta employees.
- Industry-leading operational reliability with the highest customer satisfaction of the network carriers.
- Delta's operational reliability is a key competitive advantage.
- Delta has a global network.

Senator Karen Mayne left the meeting.

D. Terminal Redevelopment Program Update

Mike Williams, Terminal Redevelopment Program (TRP) Director, presented an update on the TRP (presentation on file). Main points included were:

- Rental Car Facilities are operating and running smoothly. A separate jockey road between the existing Parking Garage and the new QTA/RSS facilities improve operations.
- Clean-up of contaminated soil is completed the existing rental car sites.
- Completed demolition of the south wing of Concourse E.
- Completed and opened the relocated Parking Garage Pay Lane Exit Road and Terminal Exit Road.
- Completion approximately 60% of the 7,000 stone columns required for this phase.
- Initiated excavation for the terminal tunnel.
- Preparing to install surcharge in the South Concourse West site.
- Design Package 4/8 Terminal/Gateway/South Concourse West bids received, analysis completed and recommendations made to award 20 of 24 trades.
- Design Package 6 Baggage Handling System recommendation to award completed.
- Design Package 5 Roads, Parking Garage and Central Utility Plant bids received.
- Terminal/Gateway/South Concourse West cost variances between estimate and current pricing.
- Utah construction activity and growth.

Mayor Biskupski raised a question regarding rental cars in general. Mayor Biskupski received a complaint regarding curbside service at the Airport and wondered if there were restrictions in place that prohibited any ground transportation provider providing service at the Airport. John Buckner responded that he was unaware of any rental car being barred from providing curb side service, but would confirm.

Bergman asked about the CGMP 5 variance summary, which showed escalation of 40%. Williams answered it was 40% of the overage. Bergman inquired about the percentage of design documents that were issued for bid. Williams responded that the structural trades, such as steel and roofing, were at 100% design. For electrical, plumbing and mechanical trades, the drawings were at 90% completion.

Cynthia Miller inquired what the variance percentages represented in dollars. Williams answered the estimated budget overrun is \$350 million.

Bergman stated that at the previous Board meeting, Senator Mayne had asked about the prequalification process and wondered if contractors are being prequalified. Williams stated that they were and that all contractors bidding have certified that they meet the prequalifications before they bid. They provide a document with the bid that certifies they provide all the benefits the program requires. Williams stated that verification is not required by City ordinance. The City ordinance does not go into detail on how to implement and execute the requirement. Riley

stated that the Mayor's office and Airport have been discussing how to enhance the process to use formal certification. Mayor Biskupski stated that this would have to be taken to the City Council and the ordinance would have to be revised.

Best-Devereux inquired if other areas besides drywall had design changes to promote more competitive pricing. Williams answered that the consideration was just on the drywall. The Construction Manager, HDJV, reached out to 63 drywall firms in addition to all the firms that were prequalified to try and generate more interest.

Riley introduced Dave Miller, President & CEO, Holder Construction and Rob Moore, President & CEO, Big D Construction who are representatives for the construction team. Riley inquired if any Board members had any questions for them at this time. Mickey Gallivan asked what the time frame was between generating our budget and receiving the bids. Williams responded approximately one year and that the Airport had an independent estimate done at the same time the TRP was preparing the estimate. The independent estimate and the TRP estimate were remarkably close at that time.

Best-Devereux asked if the construction boom cycle would continue or bust. Rob Moore answered that the trends indicate there is an abundance of work in Utah, increased market pressure on staffing for projects, labor costs have increased, material pricing is increasing and currently, a slowdown in construction is not indicated.

E. TRP Finance Update

Ryan Tesch, Finance Director, presented a (presentation on file). Main points included were:

- Plan of finance for the Airport rebuild program including the TRP and North Concourse.
- Revised estimated project costs as of September 15, 2016.
- Project overview and budget summary.
- Funding and the financial forecast.
- SLC Airport's CPE as it relates to other airports.
- Passenger Facility Charges (PFC) and Customer Facility Charges (CFC) revenue streams support ongoing and future projects.

Mayor Biskupski left the meeting at 9:15 am.

Riley informed the Board that Delta Air Lines had requested increasing the first bond issue to capture favorable bond interest rates and the Finance team will consider the request.

Miller asked how the cash on hand breaks down between operating cash and capital. Riley stated that it is total cash on hand.

Miller requested that the official statement be shared with the Board members. Riley answered that the preliminary official statement would be sent to the Board members, when published.

F. Ground Transportation Update

Nancy Volmer, Director of Public Relations & Marketing, presented an update on ground transportation (presentation on file). Main points included were:

- Ground Transportation (GT) ordinance amendments
- Transportation Network Companies (TNC)
- Rate restrictions implemented
- Customer feedback received
- Options for moving forward

Riley commented that there is an ordinance that allows the Airport Director, on a temporary basis, to implement rate restrictions in order to control escalating fares, and which is currently in effect. This waiver of rate restriction will need to be reissued every six months. The Airport has been working with the Mayor's office and City Council to try to find a way for a permanent option. Discussion ensued on the best options moving forward.

Riley informed the Board that the TRP budget increase process was complete with the approval of the Airlines to move forward.

The next Board meeting will be held the 19 October 2016.

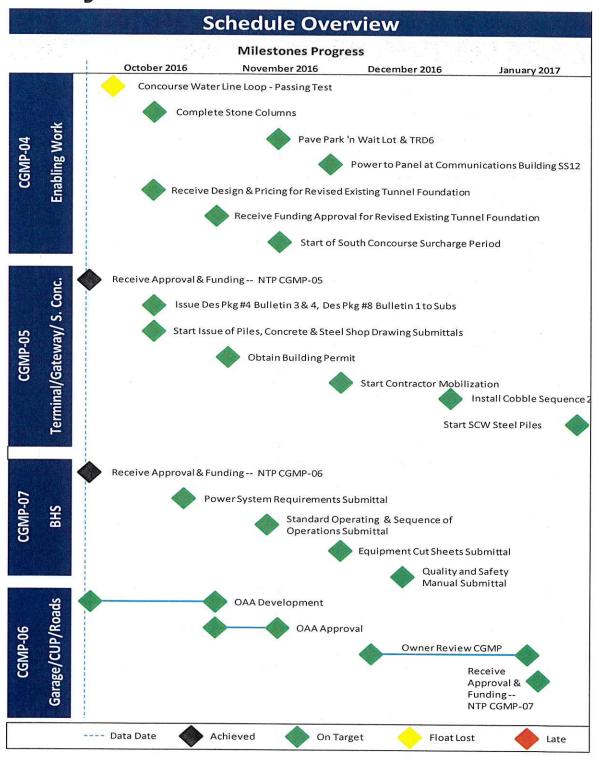

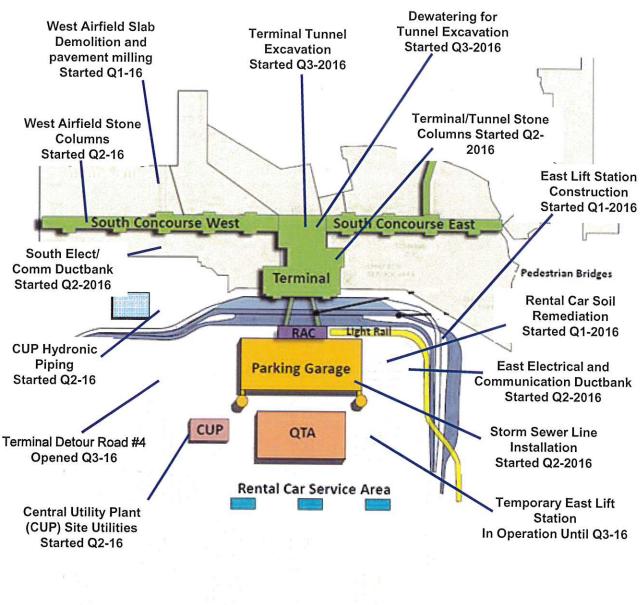


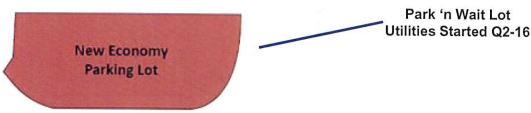
90-Day Schedule Overview

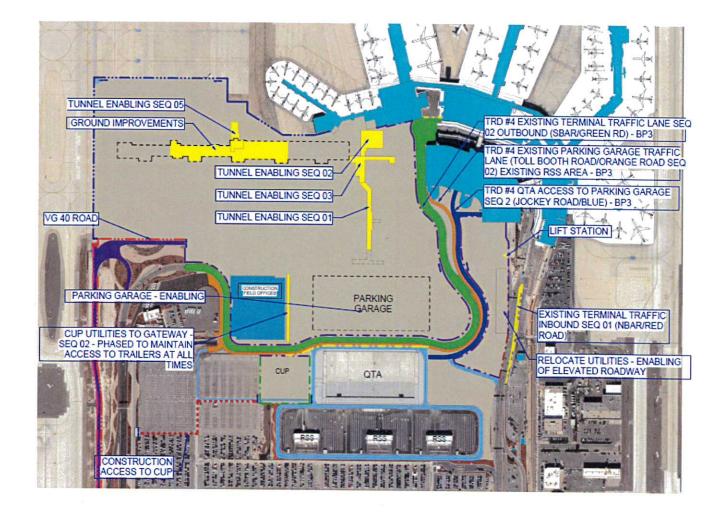

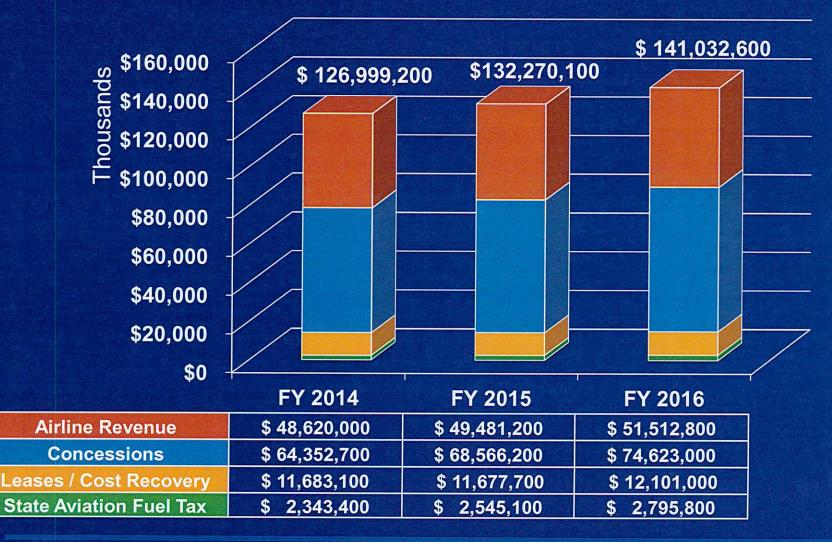

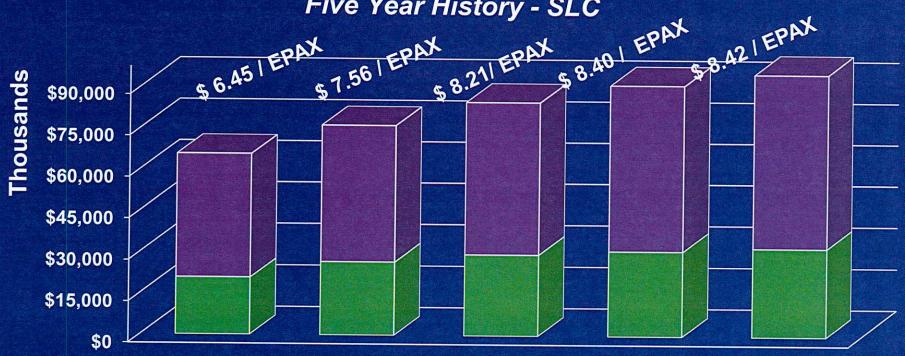

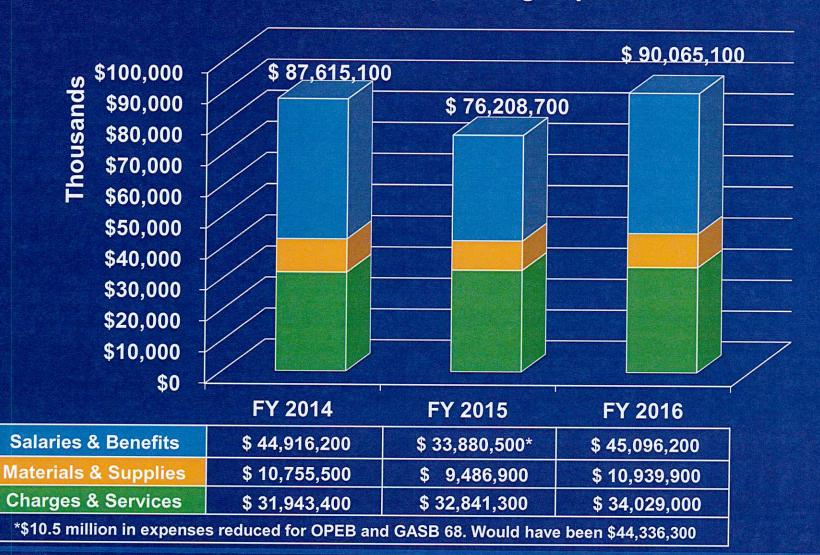
Gross Sales per Enplaned Passenger (EPAX)

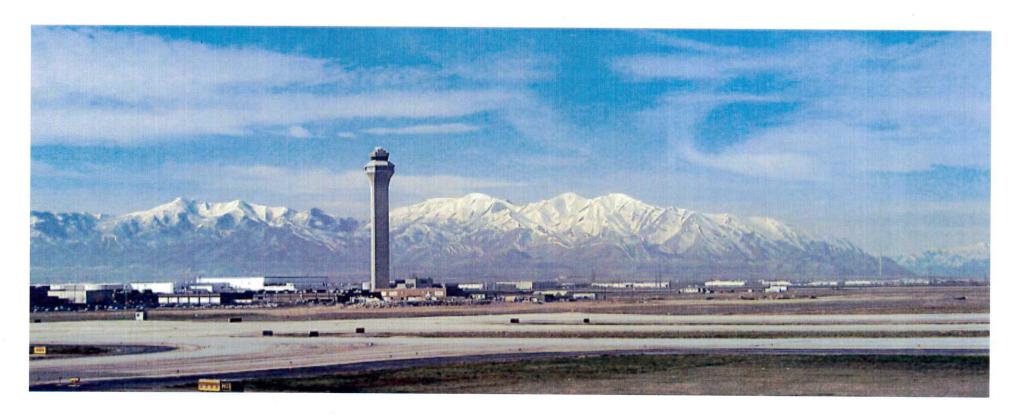

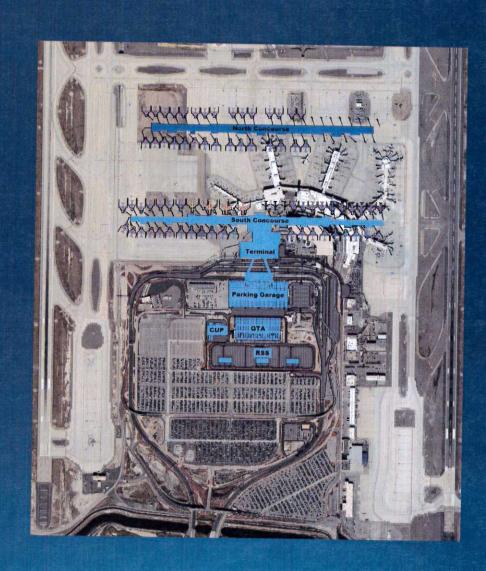

Goals of Program Controls



- Documenting all funding and construction approvals and activity
- Tracking of budgets, fund sources, contract awards, change orders, expenses, pending items, and estimated cost at completion
- Demonstrating contract compliance with terms and conditions
- Ensuring program delivery on time and within budget
- Complying with funding eligibility rules
- Incorporating checks and balances into processes
- Providing program TRANSPARENCY in all construction activities

Project development follows the budget process.



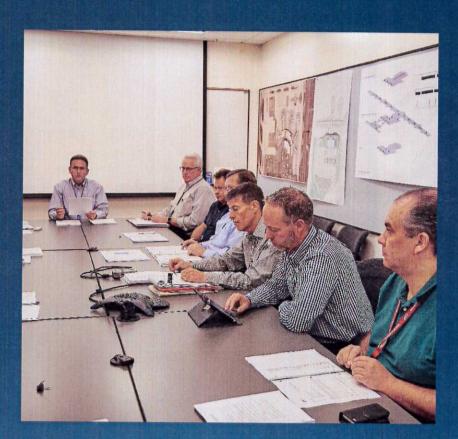
- Capital projects and TRP projects are submitted annually for review in October
- Capital projects are those in excess of \$100,000; Capital expenditures are ≤ \$100,000 and are expensed in a given year *
- Projects are reviewed by Division Directors and ranked according to:
 - Safety and security
 - Regulatory and contractual
 - Maintenance
 - Strategic
 - Other

- Mandated or essential
- Important
- Desirable
- TRP related components are budgeted year-by-year
- Projects are vetted and prioritized
- Capital projects and expenditures must be approved by Signatory airlines if paid for by Airline rates and charges
- Projects are approved by City Council in the annual budget process

Three Committees Provide Capital Oversight.

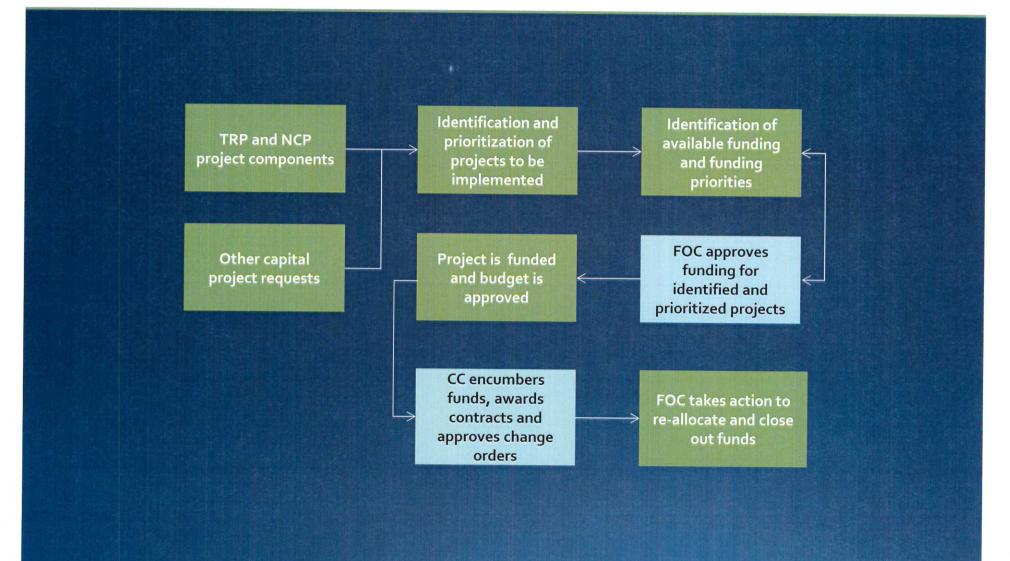


- Finance Oversight Committee (FOC) –

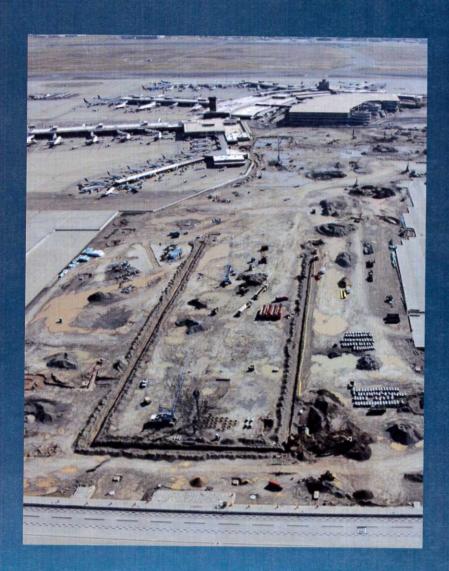




Overview of Financial Oversight Committee



- Optimizes fund usage
- Ensures that funding is assigned to projects approved in annual budget and before award of contracts
- Aligns funding and scope throughout project cycle, during budgeting and execution and through completion
- Prepares financial reports to track budget, fund sources, expenses, use of contingency, pending items, and estimated costs at completion
- Returns unused funding at project completion to fund balances
- FOC actions precede CC actions (given that CC encumbers funds)



Role of Financial Oversight Committee



ACTIONS

FOC oversees program funding and budgeting decisions for capital items

SCOPE, BUDGET and TRANSFERS

Transfers budget across projects. Transfers budget between trade packages within a Component Guaranteed Maximum Price (CGMP); changes within and outside a CGMP; funds change orders; allocates contingency.

BUDGET SHORTFALLS Adds funding to a project (bid package, CGMP, design project) with appropriate fund source.

INELIGIBLE ITEMS

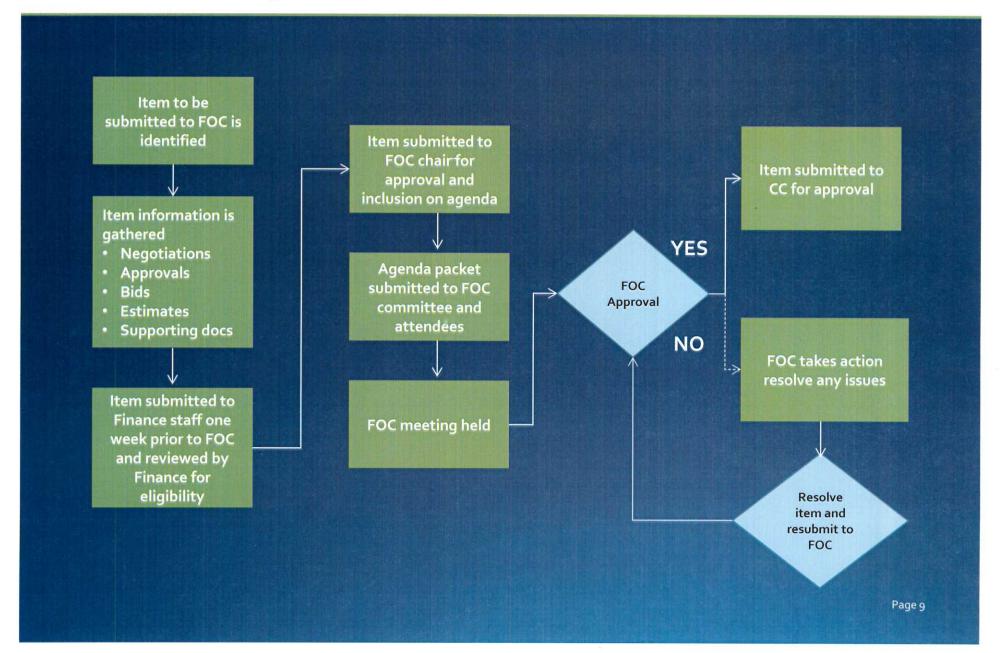

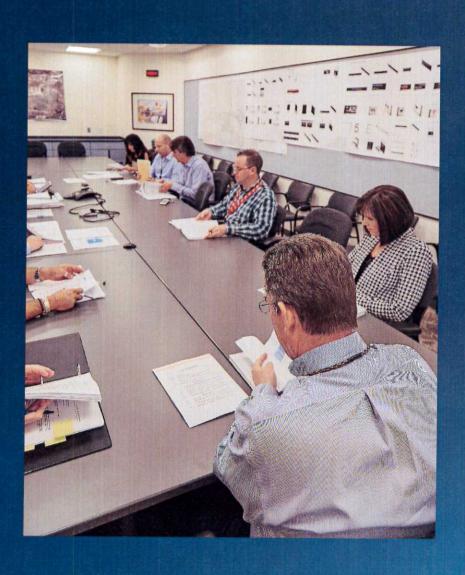
Financial Oversight Committee Flowchart

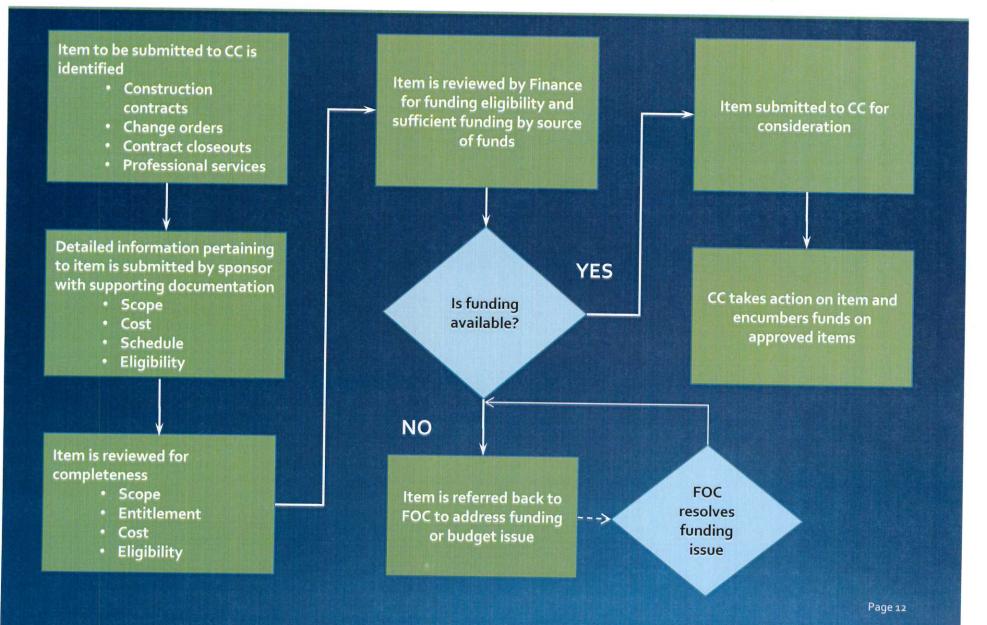

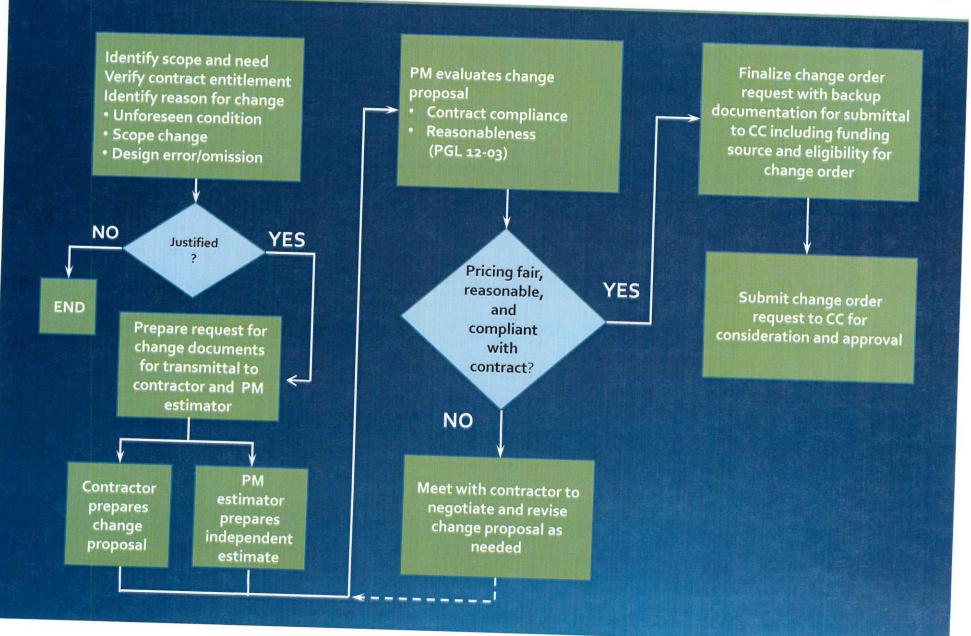
Construction Committee Flowchart

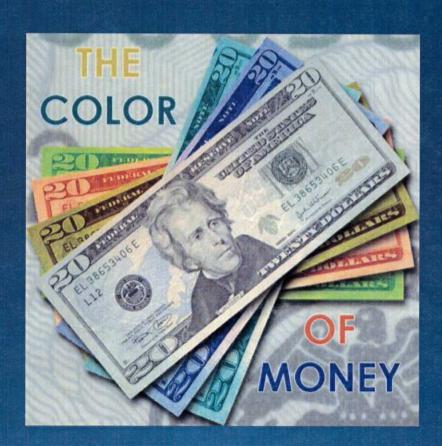

Process for determining funding eligibility



- Determination begins in the budget cycle at a programmatic level
- Further refinement is applied by FOC approval
 - Scope is reviewed for appropriate funding source
 - Ineligible costs must be identified and funding set aside
 - Availability of fungible moneys becomes more constrained over time, and may result in delays
- Coordination required for applications and approvals required of other agencies



Rules of eligibility – Airport Improvement Program grants (AIP)

- Administered by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA)
- Issued through grant applications
 - Entitlement grants Based on passenger activity
 - Discretionary grants Based on need within FAA region
- Generally, 75% of project cost requiring 25% local match
- Extensive compliance requirements
 - Competitive procurement for professional services and construction
 - Eligible scope Runways, taxiways, airfield lighting, public circulation, nonrevenue producing areas
 - Non-eligible scope Premiums or re-work, non-compliant change orders
 - Must follow AIP design standards
 - Scope must be included in grant agreement
 - Buy American, Davis-Bacon wage and DBE rules apply

Rules of eligibility - PFCs



- Overseen and approved by the FAA, but administered locally
- Airlines do not have approval authority, only consultation
- PFCs collected from enplaning passengers by air carriers as "X-fee" and remitted to airports
 - Can assess \$1, \$2, \$3, or \$4.50 per ticket on 2 segments of any one way flight
 - \$4.50 PFC application must pass an additional test that the project makes a significant contribution
- Handling fee of \$0.11 per collection paid to collecting air carriers
- Can be used for pay-as-you-go (PAYG) funding or to repay general airport revenue bonds (GARBS)
- Compliance requirements and eligible scope, similar to AIP
 - Additional rules for baggage handling systems, airport ground access, check-in positions, fuel systems, and revenue or non-public circulation areas
- Buy American, Davis-Bacon, and DBE rules do not apply, unless commingled with AIP grants

Rules of eligibility – TSA grants





- Administered by the Transportation Security Administration (TSA)
- Issued through grants or other transaction agreements (OTAs)
- Generally, 90% with local match, or 100%
- Extensive compliance requirements
 - Competitive procurement
 - Scope limited to security functions
 - Costs must be reasonable
 - Must follow AIP design standards
 - Scope defined in grant agreement
 - Buy American applies
- Examples: Security cameras, baggage handling systems

Rules of eligibility – CFCs



- Administered by the Airport in accordance with City ordinance since 2010
- Used to fund only costs of rental car (RAC) capital projects, and may provide for reasonable renewal and replacement reserves
- Collections are based on RAC contracts, \$5 per day up to 12 days
- Collected by the RAC agency and remitted to the Airport
- Compliance requirements are defined in the City ordinance
 - Competitive procurement required
 - Eligible scope Limited to costs of rental car capital projects
 - Costs must be reasonable
- Examples: Quick turn around (QTA) facility, remote service sites (RSS), allocated share of roadway system, allocated share of parking garage for ready return spaces

Rules of eligibility – Bond Proceeds



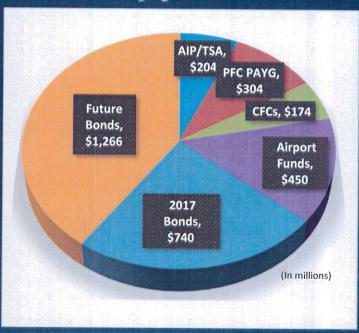
- Administered by the Airport
- Issuance of bonds approved by City Council after public hearings
- Bond proceeds held in segregated account and used to pay certain costs of construction
- Interest and principal payments made to bondholders by a trustee
- Eligible scope and costs defined in bond documents (Official statement, Supplemental Trust Indenture)
- Extensive compliance requirements are defined in City ordinances
 - Competitive procurement required
 - Project scope For any lawful airport purpose
 - Costs must be reasonable and approved by City Council in annual budget
- Examples: Terminals, airfield projects, roads, retail structure (but not build-out), parking

Rules of eligibility - Airport Funds



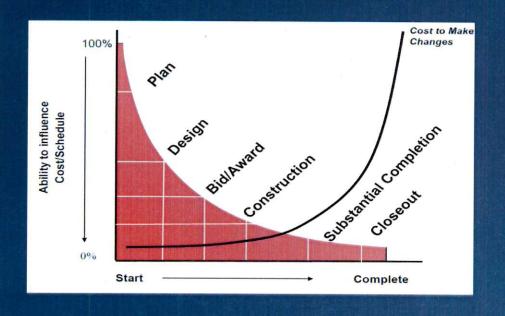
- Administered by the Airport
- Applied to:
 - Costs ineligible for other funding
 - Local match for grants
 - Projects not funded by airlines
- Approved through annual budget process
- Sourced from annual Airport surplus
- Compliance requirements defined by ordinance
 - Competitive procurement required
 - Project scope for any lawful airport purpose
 - Costs must be reasonable
 - Approved by City Council in annual budget
- Examples: Parking garage, allocated share of roadways, renewable energy projects, reliever airport projects,

Airport Plan of Finance \$3.138 Billion

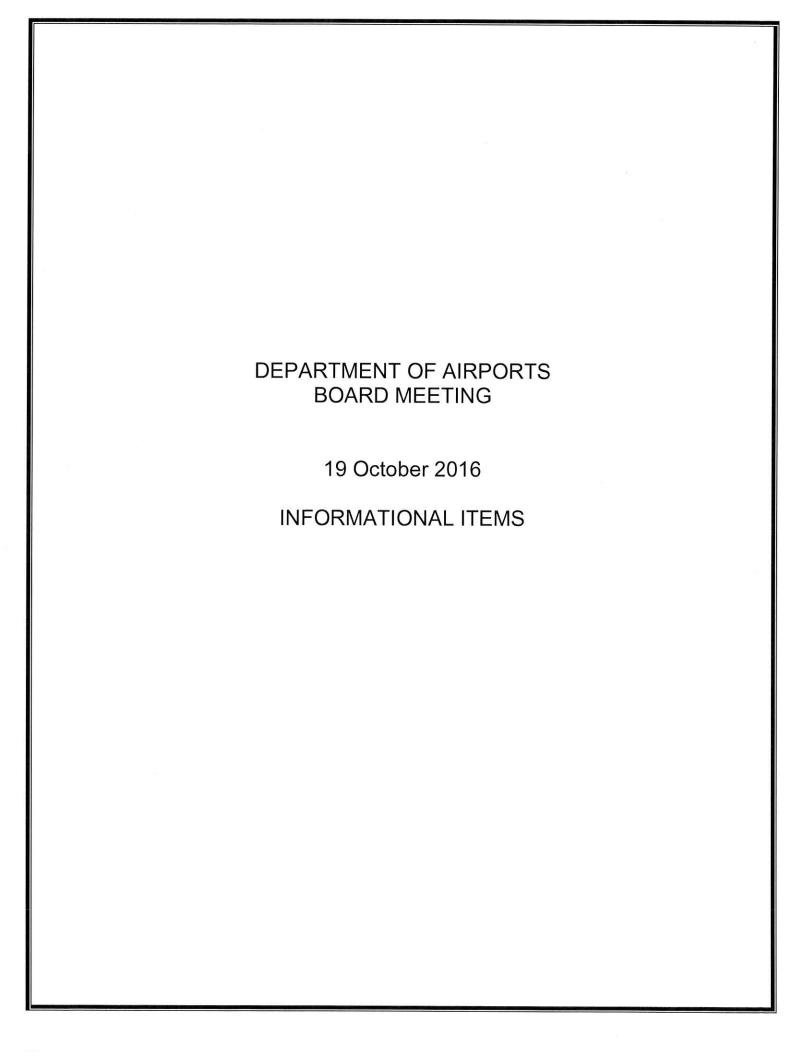


Program Controls Summary





- Program controls are based on approval of all construction related activity, for both funding and scope
- Funding is complex and subject to change, with multiple fund sources used in a single project
- Project scope and any change orders must be evaluated and negotiated
- The committee process forces transparency, resulting in alignment of funding and scope throughout construction

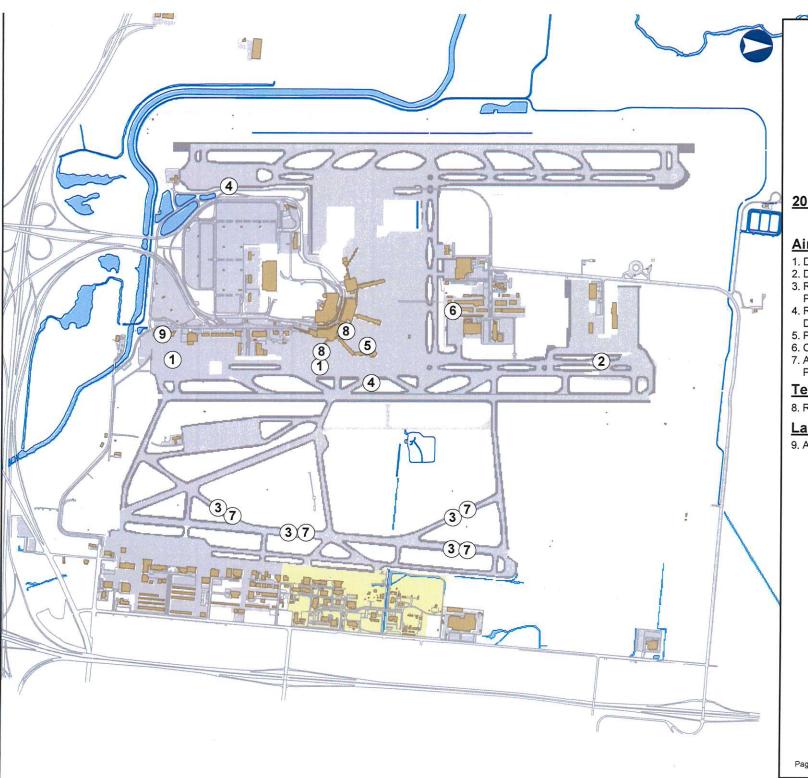

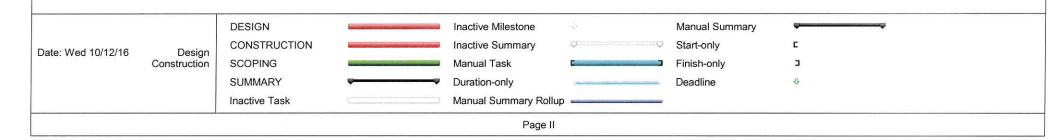

(10) SVRA R/W 16-34 & T/W A Pavement Rehabilitation - The apparent low bidder for this project is Geneva Rock Products. Contract documents are currently being executed. Construction for this project will begin in the Spring of 2017.

CONSTRUCTION

- (1) **Deicing Pad 34R** The Contractor is currently working on punch list items and warranty work.
- Deicing Pad R/W 16L The Contractor is continuing to work on Phase 3 of the project, T/W H and H12. Placement of PCC pavement is now complete and work to construct the shoulders has started. R/W 16L is closed to complete work on T/W H12 located in the runway safety area. The electrical sub-contractor is on-site installing in-pavement light bases.
- (3) Runway 17-35 and Taxiways P & R Pavement Rehabilitation The Contractor has placed new asphalt on R/W 17-35 and T/W's K1, K4 through K9, N, P and R. R/W 17-35 is temporarily opened and R/W 16L-34R is closed for one week to complete construction on T/W H12.
- (4) Runway 34L & 34R Glycol Diversion Valves The Contractor has completed installing the vaults and is currently back filling and working on electrical components on the project.
- (5) Concourse B PCC Joint Seal and Repair Phase 2 The Contractor has completed Phases 1 through 8 of the project. Phase 9 will begin next week.
- (6) Car Wash Rebuild The notice to proceed was issued for this project on October 4, 2016. The Contractor is working on the badging process with SLCDA.
- (7) **Airfield Lighting Wiring Rehabilitation Phase 1** A notice to proceed was issued to the Contractor on September 6, 2016. Installation of new wire for the airfield lighting system on Runway 14-32 and Taxiway K is currently taking place.
- (8) Roof Replacements (Terminal Area) Construction for this project is on-going and approximately 70% complete.
- (9) **Airport Operations Center -** Placement of footings, foundations and concrete slab work is on-going. Overhead fire sprinklers, mechanical ductwork, plumbing, electrical, and roofing work is also currently taking place.
