Four Years and Counting

The work to build The New SLC Redevelopment Program has been impressive, to say the least, since ground was broken in July 2014. Once the infrastructure work was completed, steel erection began and it now looks like the city is actually building a new airport! The coming year will be a significant one for the program as exterior work continues and interior work ramps up.



Exterior work on the South Concourse-West begins with placement of a green-colored sheathing, which is a base material. Next, a blue moisture barrier is installed, followed by a

beige insulation layer and then glass installation. The final layer is the installation of copper cladding that completes the exterior look.

Here are some recent milestones for each structure:

- Central Utility Plant (CUP) -- the heartbeat of The New SLC will provide cooling and heating for the entire facility. The plant's exterior work is nearly complete with masonry and roofing wrapping up, chillers and boilers installed, and a 1,600 KW generator-weighing 54,000 lb. has been delivered. - Parking Garage -- the structure at each level includes shoring and supports to carry the load of the massive concrete pours. To date, work on levels 1 through 4 is well underway on what will be a five-level garage.
- Elevated Roadway -- the upper level roadway requires the installation of columns and bents, plus the build-out of entry and exit ramps. All aspects of the roadway construction are making great progress.
- Terminal -- the lower level of the Terminal will house a massive baggage
 processing facility. Bags will be transported via a baggage system that is
 about six miles in length. A portion of the baggage system is routed
 through the tunnel beneath the terminal. Heating, ventilation and air
 conditioning (HVAC) systems are also being installed in the tunnel. Steel
 construction on the terminal is expected to be completed in mid-2018.
- South Concourse-West -- structural steel has been erected throughout the entire length of the 1,796 ft. long concourse. The steel work is followed by concrete placements, exterior wall work (see above photo) and HVAC system installation.
- Passenger Tunnel -- transporting passengers from the south to the north concourse requires a passenger tunnel, complete with moving walkways.
 Work to uncover a portion of the tunnel-built more than 10 years ago and connects to the South Concourse-West- is no small task, but is coming together nicely.
- North Concourse-West -- since announcing the addition of the North Concourse-West in May 2016, work to design the facility, hire a contractor and set-up shop has been underway.

Be sure to stop by the third floor of the parking garage on the west-end to see an overview of the construction footprint as well as a close-up look through a

Touch 'n Go Convenience Store Opens

The Salt Lake City Department of Airports has opened a 8,400 sq. ft. Touch n' Go Convenience Store to better serve the traveling public. The new \$4 million facility opened Dec. 20 with a Chevron fueling station, Beans and Brews, Burger King and Costa Vida.

The Touch n' Go Store is located adjacent to the Park and Wait lot, which is located left of Terminal Drive when exiting the freeway. The location couldn't be any more convenient for those traveling to the Airport to pick up a friend or family member and to get a quick bite to eat. The drive-through window is a time saver and the flight information monitors will make sure customers are not delayed getting to the curb on time.
