National Weather Service Weather Forecast Office Salt Lake City, Utah officials have recognized Salt Lake City International Airport as a StormReady® site. The StormReady program helps community leaders and residents better prepare for hazardous weather and flooding. StormReady sites have made a strong commitment to implement the infrastructure and systems needed to save lives and protect property when severe weather strikes.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA) Weather-Ready Nation program is about building community resilience in the face of increasing vulnerability to extreme weather and water events. Some 90% of all presidentially declared disasters are weather related, leading to around 500 deaths per year and nearly \$14 billion in damage. "As we've seen in the past year, it's not a question of if we'll be dealing with hazardous weather, but rather, when," said Kevin Barjenbruch, warning coordination meteorologist at the National Weather Service weather forecast office in Salt Lake City. "The end goal is a Weather-Ready Nation, where society is prepared for and responds appropriately to weather-dependent events. A key component of this is ensuring that community leaders make informed decisions, and that is where the StormReady program comes into play." Storm Ready communities and

organizations are "better prepared to save lives from the onslaught of severe weather through advanced planning, education, and awareness."

The nationwide community preparedness program, founded in 1999, is a grassroots approach to preparing for natural hazards. Today, more than 2,100 U.S. communities have achieved StormReady recognition.

To be recognized as StormReady, a site must maintain a 24-hour warning point and emergency operations center; have more than one way to receive National Weather Service warnings and to alert the public; be able to monitor local weather and flood conditions; conduct community preparedness programs; and ensure hazardous weather and flooding are addressed in formal emergency management plans, which include training SKYWARN® weather spotters and holding emergency exercises.

The StormReady program is part of the National Weather Service's working partnership with the International Association of Emergency Managers and the National Emergency Management Association.

Salt Lake City International Airport is one of 67 commercial sites, and the tenth airport to receive the StormReady designation. The StormReady recognition is valid for three years and can be renewed.

PASSENGERS INCREASE

A busy summer has resulted in a positive trend for passengers at Salt Lake City International Airport. Passengers have increased over the last two months compared to the same months in 2012.

During May 2013, the Airport handled 42,354 passengers which is a 2.57% increase over May 2012.

WATER BOTTLE FILLING STATIONS ARE POPULAR

Since the Salt Lake City Department of Airports installed 15 water bottle filling stations in November of 2012, they have been very popular with passengers and Airport employees.

In the first six months, counters on the stations indicate that they have been

used 462,000 times.
This means that about that many sixteen-ounce plastic water bottles have been diverted from the waste stream.

Other benefits include saving 3,416,114 cubic yards of landfill space, 155,102,871 BTU's in heat energy and 458 barrels of oil.

AIRPORT'S ECONOMIC IMPACT

By the nature of their business, airports are strong economic impact catalysts. As part of the planning process for the Terminal Redevelopment Program, the Salt Lake City Department of Airports commissioned a study conducted by GSBS Richman Consulting. Some of the findings include:

Former Salt Lake City Councilman, J.T. Martin, was recently appointed to the Salt Lake City Airport Advisory Board by Mayor Ralph Becker.

SLC in the Top Ten Fastest Airports in the Country

USA Today named Salt Lake City International Airport as one of ten United States airports that you are "likely to breeze through" in a recent article.

To determine the ten "speediest" airports in the country, the newspaper analyzed data from Bureau of Transportation Statistics, averaged real-time crowd sourced security wait time, and compared expedited-screening options, and airport layouts.

Salt Lake City continues to consistently rank first in on-time performance. The Airport was also cited for excellence with snow and ice removal and the fact that the terminals and concourses are connected beyond security screening so passengers do not have to exit and re-enter the process to make connections.

The other nine airports named are: Charlotte Douglas International Airport, San Diego International Airport, Tampa International Airport, Seattle-Tacoma International Airport, Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport, Portland International Airport, Hartsfield-Jackson International Airport, Boston Logan International Airport, and Washington Reagan National Airport.
